

VOTING WHEN YOU'RE OUT OF STATE

What to know if you live, study, or travel away from home



WHY THIS CAN BE CONFUSING



Voting rules depend on your state

- Many people live in one state and vote in another
- States run their own elections
- Rules can vary based on residency and registration

WHERE YOU'RE REGISTERED MATTERS



You vote where you're registered

- Voters are registered in one state at a time
- Registration determines where you're eligible to vote
- Being physically elsewhere doesn't automatically change registration

COMMON OUT-OF-STATE SITUATIONS



Common scenarios:

- Attending school in another state
- Temporarily working or traveling
- Military or overseas voters
- Living in two places during the year

OPTIONS FOR VOTING



Options may include:

- Voting absentee or by mail (if available)
- Voting early or in person (if you're in your registered state)
- Checking state-specific rules before election deadlines

WHEN YOU MIGHT NEED TO UPDATE REGISTRATION



Update your registration:

- If you establish residency in a new state
- If your address has permanently changed
- If state law requires re-registration

HOW TO CHECK YOUR REGISTRATION



Check your registration status:

- Confirm where you're registered
- Review voting options available to you
- Use trusted, nonpartisan tools like those from [Vote Online](#)
