What Are Primaries?

Primaries are elections that political parties hold before a General Election. They determine which candidates will represent each party on the ballot in the General Election. Think of them as a "first round" where voters help decide the party's nominee.

Types of Primaries

1. Closed Primary – Only voters registered with a political party can vote in that party's primary.
2. Open Primary – Any registered voter can vote in any party's primary, but only for one party.
3. Semi-Closed / Semi-Open – Varies by state; some allow unaffiliated voters to pick a party primary.

Why Primaries Matter

- Shape the choices in the general election: Your vote influences which candidates make it to the ballot.
- Encourage voter participation: Primaries give communities, students, businesses, faith groups, first-time voters, a voice early in the process.
- Highlight issues that matter locally and nationally: Candidates often focus on policies important to voters in these early elections.

Quick Tip: Check your state's rules for primaries! Some states hold them months before the general election, and your eligibility to vote may depend on your party registration.
