



NEVADA

Conducting a voter registration drive in Nevada requires adherence to state procedures, particularly regarding form handling and submission deadlines.

- Voter registration applications must be submitted within 10 days of receipt or by the registration deadline (whichever comes first—this applies to mail and in-person registrations).
- Online registration is open until the Thursday before Election Day.
- While no training is required, organizations requesting 50 or more forms must complete a distribution plan (charges may apply if requesting more than 50 in a calendar year).
- Organizers may not photocopy blank state registration forms. Must obtain originals from Secretary of State or county clerks. Federal mail-in forms are acceptable.
- Must be based strictly on hours worked, not the number/type of registrations. Monetary incentives to applicants are prohibited.
- When assisting applicants, drive workers may only complete sections of the form at the applicant's request, and must sign the assistance acknowledgement.
- Although Nevada does not prohibit retaining completed forms, it is best practice to avoid storing sensitive personal data like Social Security or driver's license numbers (Once the drive concludes, all completed forms should be submitted promptly, and sensitive data handled carefully).



NEW HAMPSHIRE

New Hampshire does not allow third-party voter registration or organized registration drives.

- All voter registration must be conducted in person by the individual with election officials, either at the town or city clerk's office, during a scheduled, or on Election Day at the polling place.
- Supervisors of the Checklist meeting (held 6–13 days before each election).
- Voters are required to provide proof of identity, age, citizenship, and domicile, (satisfied through various documents such as a driver's license, passport, or utility bill).
- For those registering by mail due to an absentee situation, the federal mail-in voter registration form can only be used to request the New Hampshire-specific absentee registration form (which must be obtained from and returned to the local clerk's office at least 10 days before Election Day).
- New Hampshire law emphasizes personal, direct interaction with election officials and restricts third-party involvement.



NORTH CAROLINA

Voter registration applications must be received or postmarked at least 25 days before Election Day.

- Organizations conducting voter registration drives are required to submit completed forms.
- Submit forms to appropriate County Board of Elections within 5 days of receipt or by the registration deadline (whichever comes first).
- Same-day registration is only available during early voting—not on Election Day.
- Training, notification, or registration for voter registration drives is not required but staff/volunteers must maintain a log of who is assigned to each set of forms.
- Organizers must follow strict rules laid out by the State Board of Elections (detailed guide at ncsbe.gov).
- Drives may not compensate workers based on how many registrations they collect (quota-based systems are illegal).
- To obtain forms in bulk, organizations must request them through the State Board of Elections.
- Both state and federal registration forms are permitted for use, but officials request the return of all unused forms.
- All forms, complete or incomplete, must be submitted unaltered (by fax, mail, email, or in-person).
 - If faxed/emailed, a physical copy must be delivered within 20 days before the election.
- Pre-marking party affiliation is only allowed if requested by the applicant.
- Sticky notes or other markings on forms are prohibited.
- Drives are asked to maintain logs of who was responsible for each batch of applications.
- It is illegal to retain voters' sensitive data (full/partial Social Security Numbers, birthdates, email addresses, or signatures).
- Applications without a postmark are accepted if received no later than 20 days before the election.
- Electronically captured or computer-generated signatures on registration forms from third-party groups are not accepted, except for military and overseas voters allowed by law.



OHIO

Voter registration applications must be received or postmarked at least 30 days before Election Day (deadline extended to the next business day if the usual deadline falls on a holiday or weekend).

- Ohio does not require training or prior notification for drives.
- State registration forms can be downloaded online, and federal mail-in forms are also accepted.
- Blank forms may be photocopied for use in drives. Providing pre-filled or pre-printed forms to applicants is illegal.
- Completed applications may be photocopied, but sensitive information should not be retained.
- Completed applications collected during a drive must be submitted to the Secretary of State or the county board within 10 days or by the registration deadline, whichever comes first.



PENNSYLVANIA

Voter registration applications must be received by 5 p.m. on the 15th day before Election Day.

- Training or prior notification is not required.
- It is illegal to pay participants based on the number of registrations collected or to offer monetary incentives.
- Registration forms can be obtained for free from the Secretary of State's website or requested via email or phone, and while the state prefers its specific forms, the federal mail-in registration form is also acceptable.
- Blank applications may be photocopied if they meet paper quality standards.
- Helpers must not add information without consent; must sign and provide an address.
- Applicants should use full legal names as on official documents.
- Completed applications must be submitted promptly to the County Voter Registration Office.
- Pennsylvania allows online voter registration via Web API for registered organizations.



TEXAS

In Texas, voter registration applications must be submitted by the 30th day before Election Day (Deadline extended if it falls on weekend/holiday).

- In Texas, only authorized Volunteer Deputy Registrars (VDRs)—U.S. citizens, Texas residents aged 18+, who complete state training and hold a certificate of appointment, may deliver voter registration applications.
- VDRs may only accept applications from residents of their authorized counties.
- VDRs issue receipts and must deliver applications and receipts to the county registrar within five days or by the business day after deadline.
- Paying based on the number of registrations is illegal.
- Non-VDR volunteers may distribute blank forms but cannot collect/submit completed forms.



WISCONSIN

In Wisconsin, voter registration applications deadline are the third Wednesday before Election Day, but voters can also register in person at a municipal clerk's office until 5:00 pm the Friday before the election, or at the polls on Election Day.

- Wisconsin does not require training for voter registration drives, and since the adoption of online voter registration, there are no special registration deputies.
- Drives may assist applicants but can only submit applications with a photocopy of the voter's proof of residence.
- State mail-in form is online, may be photocopied; state form preferred over federal.
- Submit proof with application; volunteers cannot keep copies.
- Acceptable proof includes a current Wisconsin driver's license or ID, utility bills, bank statements, government-issued documents, or a residential lease (except for mail-in registration).
- May only fill missing information with permission; applicant signs unless unable.
- Drives may not retain sensitive personal information (DOB, driver's license, SSN).
